

PREVENTING SENIOR FRAUD

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Research shows, only about 1 in 25 fraud-related crimes are reported to Law Enforcement. Shame and embarrassment can play a role in a older adult's hesitation to talk about being scammed. Help Protect Against Scams

Insist that your senior utilize caller ID and an answering machine to screen calls. Add seniors to the national Do Not Call Registry for their land-line and consider installing a block system to reduce spam and robocalls on cell phones and landlines.
Provide continuous reminders, including signage to never give out personal information, financial information or money over the phone. The rule to follow, "never provide any information on a call that you did not initiate."
Always shred documents that could be useful to criminals, such as bank statements, credit card statements-offers, and any document with medical information. Documents that need to be maintained should be kept in a secure location.
Post a "No Solicitation" notice near each exterior door of the seniors home. Consider setting up a P.O. Box to route mail, so it can be reviewed with the senior. Monitor for look-alike letters from fake charities, the Internal Revenue Service or Social Security Administration.
Monitor new friendships, as seniors may feel lonely and vulnerable to criminals who take interest in them and provide companionship.
Remember all technology has a learning curve. Educate senior loved ones about email, phony Apple-Microsoft virus and phishing scams.
Seniors who are scammed may feel embarrassed and try to hide it. Watch for changes in lifestyle, financial or business activity. If a loved one can no longer handle their finances, encourage them to put a plan in place to ensure bills are paid and financial accounts are protected and monitored.

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
